



History of the Rail Trail

Melrose, at the base of Mount Remarkable, lays claim to being the oldest town in the Flinders Ranges, tracing its origins back to 1853.

The line was built after South Australia was rapidly establishing itself as Australia's pre-eminent colony in terms of wheat production. Farmers in the country were struggling to transport their goods, recorded as far back as 1860.

The railway line started in Gladstone, opened 2nd June 1884, and continued through rural towns including Laura, Stone Hut, Wirrabara, Yandiah, Booleroo Centre, Perroomba, Melrose, Terka and Wilmington.

From Melrose, the line turned slightly from west towards north, crossed the Main North Road then the Willochra Creek heading towards Wilmington.

Wilmington was originally called Beautiful Valley but the name was changed in 1876.

Wilmington's line was completed and officially opened on 20th July 1915.

The last train recorded in Wilmington was 28th July 1988 carrying the season's grain from the Wilmington Silo.
